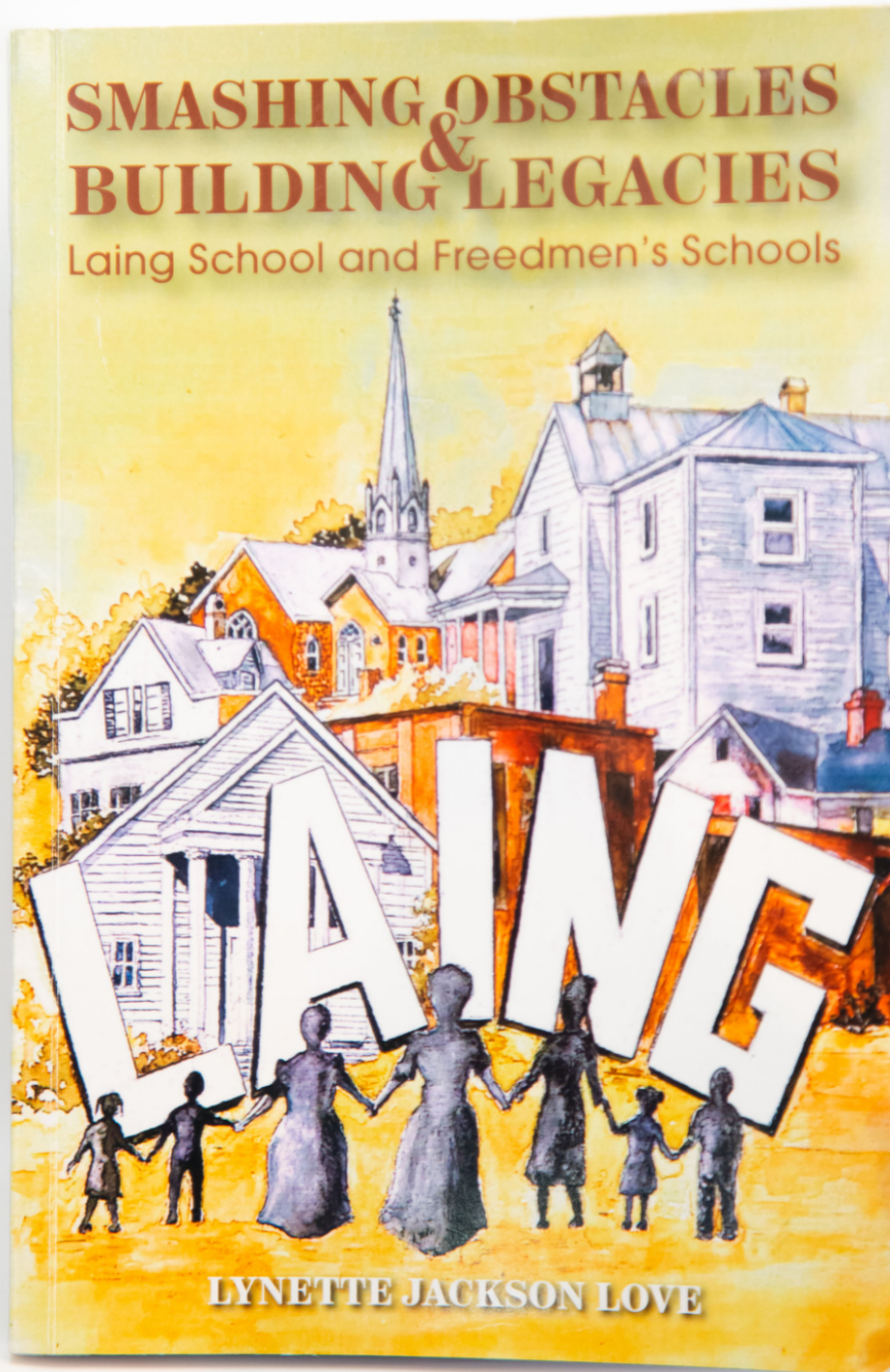

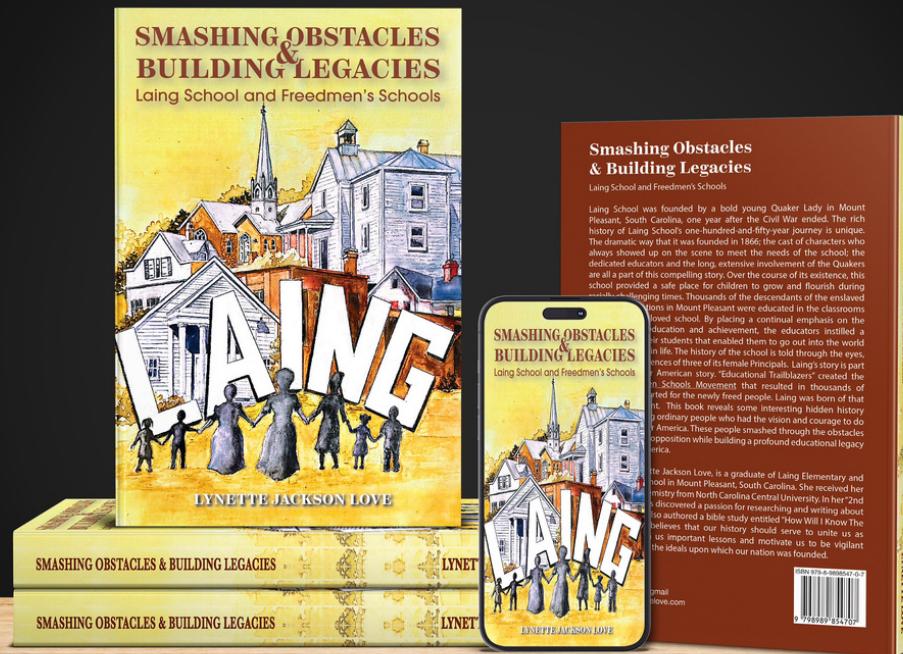


Greetings. I'm Lynette!

Laing School and Freedmen's Schools

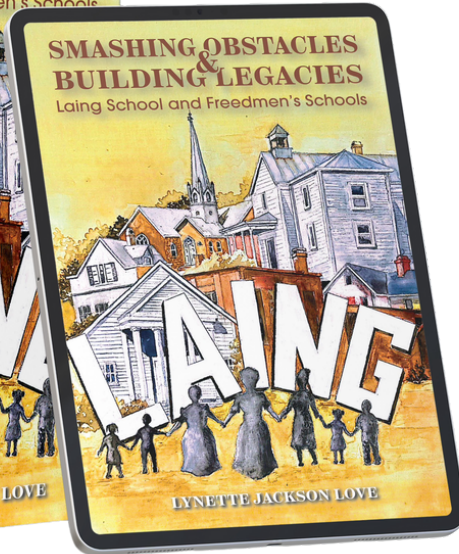
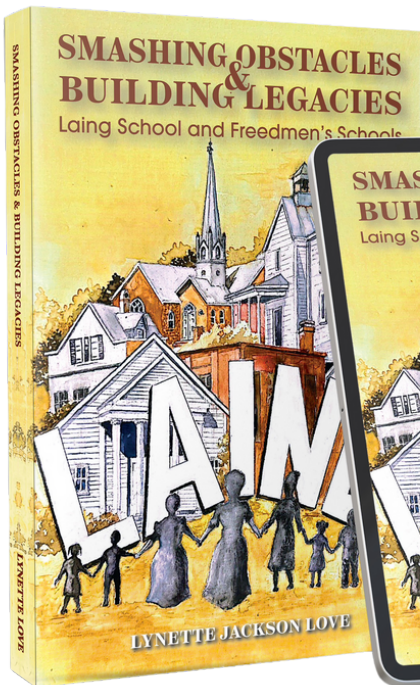

A Civil War, Freedmen, Quakers, Reconstruction and a Beloved School.

This story begins with the fall of Charleston in 1866 when Union Soldiers, including Colored Troops, marched victoriously into that city and were received with an outpouring of joy by thousands of people that had been enslaved. One year later, just outside of Charleston, a young Quaker lady named Cornelia Hancock started Laing School. Laing served multiple generations of the descendants from the many plantations in Mt. Pleasant, SC for over 150 years. From Cornelia's letters we learn details about the Union soldiers, the Freedmen's Bureau agents and the Colored Soldiers (USCT) stationed in Mt Pleasant during Reconstruction. She had worked closely with the Freedmen's Bureau to get the resources needed for the School. Laing was blessed to have had a long line of determined, tough, and very dedicated educators who kept that school going for over a century and a half. I tell the story of Laing's history through the eyes, words and experiences of three of its female Principals.

Laing's story is unique, but it is also representative of the thousands of schools that were built during the Freedmen Schools Movement. Most of these schools didn't survive. As the southern plantation system began to crumble during the Civil War, thousands of the enslaved ran to freedom behind Union lines. They ended up in "Contraband" camps where they encountered suffering, sickness and death. Freedmen Schools began in these camps. This is the part of my research that brought me to tears. But the way that Americans responded to the resulting humanitarian crisis in those camps served to bolster my faith in people.

This book highlights hidden history and the ordinary Americans who had the courage to do what was right for America. These trailblazers created the Freedmen Schools Movement which was a profound educational legacy that changed America.
